The Big Smoke

So, how accurate are you? I know you've been doing it, that glance out the window, then a quick check on PurpleAir to see how close you got.

Being down-wind of the Caldor fire is proving to be a lot worse than cross-wind of Tamarack, isn't it? Many of our weekend rides, mountain bike rides, and road races have been either postponed, relocated or cancelled.



So, what can we cyclists do about it? Here are a few ideas:

- If it's clear, get out on your bike, quick! That brown haze will be rolling back in at the next wind change, so prioritize your physical & mental health over answering that email or re-organizing that sock drawer.
- Use the technology. It's amazing what's at our fingertips now, online weather forecasts, smoke maps (AirNow, PurpleAir), and attempts to put the two together as smoke forecasts (gis.trpa.org). No guarantees of accuracy, but if these can tip you off that it's clear a few miles away, go for it!
- Try out new locations, new rides. Let the clearer air steer you towards somewhere new. That happened at last Tuesday's evening MTB ride. The smoke and forest closures drove us to a trail we'd never considered before, Noble Canyon. Wow, really enjoyed it, felt like an escape from Alcatraz.
- If you can, get away for a few days. Use all the technology & crystal ball gazing to guess where it'll be clear and get out there. We've had success recently with trips to Mendocino and Mammoth/Bishop. Great riding destinations.
- At Alta Alpina, we'll keep rides, races & events going as usual, in the hope that they hit a clear patch. But do check the rideboard, email or social media just before leaving, to see if there's been a change of venue or date.

As for me, I'm normally within +/- 50. But I am really hoping not to get enough practice to get any better...

Educating Drivers

Hey, that cyclist is in my lane!

Bill Magladry recently wrote the following article for the CVVA to help educate motorists on bicycle safety (and to help promote Carson Valley as bicycle friendly destination).

Cars & Bikes

Carson Valley is home to some outstanding road cyclists, including a few national and world champions. This is a top cycling destination. Some riders decide to live here after visiting the valley with so many close proximity and challenging rides just outside their door. Its also a valley where the majority of vehicle drivers are very considerate of cyclists, pulling over to give far more than the required 3 ft passing room. This is really appreciated, even if the rider is holding the bars too tightly to give you a friendly wave!

Virtually all cyclists are also vehicle drivers, so are acutely aware that some of their maneuvers might be considered annoying by drivers. For example, what appears to be a rude cyclist farther out in the lane while others are along the edge of the road.

You may be witnessing a 'pace line'. The key limiting factor to a cyclist's speed is wind/drag. Therefore, cyclists like to ride in a line for better aerodynamics and greater speed. However, the person in front does most of the work, or "pulling" as it's called. After pulling anywhere from thirty seconds to a few minutes, the lead cyclist typically moves to his left, allowing the pace line to pass him on the right, upon which he takes his place in the rear, until the next leader does the same process.

So, if you happen to drive by a group of cyclists, and one seems to be behaving 'rudely', they may have just finished their pull and are making their way back to the end of the line. Thank you for being patient and kind! It equally helps to consider you may be witnessing some of the top athletes in the country who could be on a 50 or 100 mile training ride.

Leon Malmed Wins Gold

An 83-year old South Lake Tahoe resident gets Gold along with 2 Silver Medals at the Masters Road Cycling National Championships in Albuquerque New Mexico.

At the age of 83, Alta Alpina Cycling Club member Leon Malmed signed up to compete in three races at the annual USA Cycling Road National Championship.

Leon had dreamed about his participation in this event for over a year and has been training mostly indoor due to the smoke issues. He had no idea about the level required to be competitive.

In the first race, a Time Trial of 20 km (12.4 miles), he came in 2nd and won the Silver Medal. All the other participants had a Triathlon bike designed specifically for Time Trial racing while Leon was riding a standard road bike.

The second race, a 50km (32.3 miles) road race, featured a mile-long 14% grade which forced several riders to walk. Leon came second and won his second Silver Medal despite dealing with "Montezuma's revenge" since the previous race.

On Sunday morning, the day of the last race, when Leon opened the curtains of his hotel room, he could not see the mountains due to smoke, the sun was just a red circle and the AQI was 158.

Would the race be cancelled? It was not.

The last race was a 1.1 mile-per-lap criterium for 45 minutes and he finished first with a strong lead for the Gold Medal.

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Two silver medals and one gold qualify for the coveted title of "Best All-Around Rider" for the race category.

Leon asked the other racers in his category how long they had been cycling. "Since they were 16" was the answer! He got into biking when he was 65. when a friend lent him a racing road bike three sizes too large. Not knowing anything about cycling, Leon felt good and made quick progress. He fell in love with the sport

and soon bought his own bike. A few years later, after movingto South Lake Tahoe and joining Alta Alpina, he started participating in the weekly races.

Leon is a WWII Holocaust Survivor. He became an orphan at the age of 4 & 1/2 when his parents died in Auschwitz. He and his sister were hidden for three years and saved by a French Christian family of four at the risk of their own lives.

Leon and his wife have been homeowners in South Lake Tahoe for the last 32 years. Leon likes to say that when he first came to Tahoe in 1989 for a weekend, he felt home for the first time in his life.

Board Meeting Minutes – August 2, 2021

Secretary: Michael Bayer; Other Board Members: Bruce Eisner (Vice-president); Allen Forbes (Membership); Nigel Leigh (President); Carlo Luri (Advocacy); Jim Sadilek (Website); Gregg Westerbeck (Membership Growth and Social Media); Joseph Whitely (Race Director)

Meeting held at Nigel's House Called to order at 6:08 pm

1. Monthly Status Reports:

- **Treasurer**: The current checking account balance is \$19,829.11. The Paypal balance is \$11,630.03. The effective cash balance after pending liabilities is \$30,340.09. We anticipate expenses of about \$2500 for the balance of the year and we owe approximately \$1000 for storage unit fees.
- **Membership**: Allan reported one new member over the last month.
- Weekend Rides: Weekly rides from Big Daddy's have been going well but participation in other weekend rides has been low due to smoke and vacation travel.
- Weekly MTB Rides: Turn-out for the Tuesday rides has also been low due to smoke and member travel.
- · Social Media: Gregg has been promoting races,

and weekend rides via social media.

- **Newsletter**: Michael will get the newsletter out after receiving the presidential posting, interim race results. and other contributor items.
- Weekly Road Races: Attendance is about half of normal. This is probably due to smoke and members getting away after a long lockdown. Joseph is working on trying to get the numbers back to where they used to be including contacting racers we haven't seen so far this year. Joseph is training his wife to be race steward so he can return to racing himself.
- NICA Team: Recruiting and getting the team up and running is going well. There are about 50 racers and 20 coaches signed up. Training rides have returned to Covid protocols with smaller groups and wearing masks before and after rides. The first race will be a time trial to establish start orders for subsequent races.
- Fall Century: No Update.
- Adopt A Highway: Board members shared their



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observations on the status of Alpine County roads after the Tamarack fire. Carlo suggested that we may wish to do a cleanup in the area of Mud Lake Rd. and Diamond Valley in addition to Highway 89, particularly if most of our Highway Clean-up area is burned and/or off-limits. Michael pointed out there's likely to be lots to clear up after the utility crews go through the corridor.

- · Pinenut Cracker: No Report.
- King of Kingsbury Time Trial: No Report.
- **Challenge**: Michael reported that most of the accounting has been completed and the event ultimately did quite well financially this year. Michael continues to work on tasks to wrap up the 2021 Challenge.
- Mixed Terrain: Recent fires, including the Tamarack fire, have now significantly impacted three of the five Carson Valley Adventure Ride Series courses which leaves us with just two viable courses. The two remaining courses are the ones based in Genoa and it was never anticipated that both would be staged in the same year. As long as we don't have a fire in the Tahoe basin or Genoa, or a bigger fire off Jack's Valley these remain viable. However, with Covid still a factor, the process for getting permissions for either Genoa loop has become quite complicated. We will try to stage a club ride on one of these courses in the fall. We may need to focus on the virtual event rather than the original series in 2022. Michael is working to find a new jersey vendor who can make jerseys for the virtual event and satisfy our requirements for the Challenge and even the
- Bike Advocacy: TAMBA is holding their annual party at 4pm on Sunday. Jim Sadilek has been tracking news about the incident in which a cyclist was killed by a motorist in Washoe Valley. However the NHP continues to withhold any information on the incident. Carlo reported that proposed NV state legislation making the motorist presumptively guilty in situations like this didn't make it out of committee. What did make it through the legislative process was a bill expanding training for motorists and clarification that motorists can cross a double yellow in order to give cyclists the three feet of clearance already required by law. Carlo also wanted to acknowledge the efforts of John Erb, the county

traffic engineer responsible for making sure that the awesome bike lanes were installed on Centerville Road along with a number of other key routes around Carson Valley

- Website: Jim reported that he has created a new NICA team page on the club website and is working on the new planned giving page. Jim will work with Drew to finalize the content. We'll also explore adding a page for members selling bikes and bike gear.
- 2. Future Club Financing: Carlo expressed concern that funding the club primarily through earnings from the annual Alta Alpina Challenge may not be sustainable. Currently the club generates revenue by collecting membership dues, racing fees, and profit from the Challenge with the latter providing the majority of the club's funding. Fires, floods, and Covid have resulted in not having profit from the Challenge three of the last six years. Carlo proposed an alternative funding strategy that would make higher membership dues the primary source for club funds. Carlo's proposal involves continuing to hold significant events like the spring century, fall century, Death Ride Training Series, and 8 Pass Challenge which would be free for members with a goal of attracting members from outside the area who would normally just pay a participation fee for an event. Also under the proposal, Members who volunteer at a certain level would receive a significant discount on their annual membership fees.

This proposal and the underlying concerns were discussed at length. A key concern was that the board isn't clear on how members perceive the value of their club membership. One board members suggested that Alta Alpina should no longer provide food at any member events (including parties and centuries). Another concern raised was that few on the board are actually familiar with the effort needed to manage the Challenge and other events. Converting the Challenge to one or more large club events, paid for through membership dues, might actually require more effort and expose the club to more financial uncertainty.

Next steps are to look at other options and try to financially model the proposal.
